# **Scholarship Committee**

he scholarship committee has gone through significant preparation to be ready to make awards once the scholarship designated funds reach the trigger point for the program.

Committee members have met with multiple foundations in Montana to understand the types of scholarship funds available at each foundation. They have also gathered information about the minimum opening balance, minimum granting balance, start up fees, and annual fees for each product offered by those foundations.

A comprehensive set of qualification criteria, selection criteria, an evaluation rubric, and selection committee preparatory materials have been designed. #### November 2022



I n 1983, I accepted a one-year appointment to serve as band director at Great Falls High School. Bill Larson was about to take a one-year sabbatical to earn his music supervisor's certificate. Bill was remarkably well organized and left me a notebook that covered all aspects of the program, for which I was very grateful. He even invited me to participate in the drum major selection process for the coming fall, which I happily accepted.

Long story short, Bill's preparations helped a facilitate a successful year, and upon his return, he moved into the music supervisor's position, which allowed me to stay put. It was also incredible timing, as I had recently become engaged, and Laurie was hired to teach middle school vocal/ general music in Great Falls. We both appreciated our ability to put down roots in the community.

After one more year, the school system switched from a three-year high school system to four. High school music numbers exploded, and we moved to three bands, eight choirs, and two string orchestras . . . and Laurie moved up to join the music staff at GFHS.

Out of about 1800 students in the school, we had between 500 and 600 students involved in music. Paul Ritter, as the senior choir director and department chair, knew more about my job than I did, so I was very appreciative of his help and guidance. Linda Lydiard was also a fabulous colleague and I enjoyed sharing rehearsal space and collaborating with her. Laurie enjoyed her choirs, and also brought her handbell expertise from the middle school and created three new handbell choirs at the high school level. We added music theory and history classes and I was amazed to be a part of a fantastic team of professionals – not just at GFHS, but across the entire community.

I saw about 210 students each day during my final three years. Of the three bands, the top two combined to form the marching band, which rehearsed at 6:55 a.m. – not a favorite time for students or parents (or me), but a necessary evil to avoid after-school conflicts. The top band supported boys' basketball and the second band played for the girls. We also had a curricular jazz band as well as a second group after school.

I cherish the memories of my five years at Great Falls High School. I enjoyed supporting the many who successfully auditioned for All-State and All-Northwest, the trips to AA Band Festivals were fantastic, and I continue to remember the experiences of the Symphonic Band trips to the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary and the performances at the All-Northwest Music Educators conference in Portland. I also loved the shared Christmas programs, which always ended with all the ensembles performing *Peace, Peace*, and the combined spring concerts where we packed everybody into the old gym. It underscored how working together was so much better than being competitive between our particular programs of study.
